

Summer Ethics Fellowships for Graduate Students Interested in Careers in Journalism

FASPE Journalism, one component of a larger program for graduate students in several professional fields, uses the conduct of reporters and media professionals in Nazi Germany and the Holocaust as a launching point for an intensive course of study on journalism ethics. FASPE is predicated upon the power of place, and in particular the first-hand experience of visiting Auschwitz and traveling through Germany and Poland where Fellows study the past and consider how to apply the lessons of history as they confront the ethical challenges of their profession today.

In 2013 FASPE will take a group of 10-15 graduate students working towards careers in journalism on an all expenses-paid program from New York to Berlin, Oświęcim (Auschwitz), and Nuremberg where they will examine such topics as: the ethical challenges in reporting human rights abuses, the relationship between state authority and journalism (including censorship and propaganda), the ethics of photographing violence, and the role of media in creating and remembering the historical narrative.

The tentative program dates in 2013 are from Sunday, May 26 to Thursday, June 6. The fellowships, worth \$10,000, will cover all program costs, including international and European travel, lodging, and food.
